Birkland, Gladys

Biography:

Gladys Evelyn (Jensen) Birkland was born in Red Lake Falls, Minnesota on November 15, 1918, to James Gould Jensen and Randina (Rockne) Jensen. She attended Central High School in St. Paul, Minnesota, where one of her underclassmen was American cartoonist Charles Schultz. While in high school she took art training. Birkland was 17 years old and taking a leave of absence for illness from high school in 1935 when she started writing to L.M. Montgomery, who was encouraging of her artwork.

Gladys worked as a fashion illustrator for Dayton's Department Store and designed greeting cards for the Buzza Company, both located in Minneapolis. On November 14, 1942, Gladys married John Arden Birkland. They had one child, Carol.

She was also employed by Archeologist, Dr. Erich F. Schmidt of the University of Chicago in the mid-1940s, to illustrate potsherds he brought back from the ruins of Persepolis in Persia. She worked here until her husband John returned from the war

The Birkland family lived in St. Paul, Twin Cities, Montevideo, and Lakefield, Minnesota, Gladys died on January 20, 2007, in Lakefield, and is buried in Lakefield Cemetery, Minnesota.
